

since none survive. However, in 1745 Greenleaf advertised that he kept a shop on Queen Street opposite the prison, where

*He makes and mends all Sorts of Mathematical Instruments, as Theodolites, Spirit Levels, Semicircles, Circumferences [sic], and Protractors, Horizontal and Equinoctial Sun Dials, Azimuth and Amplitude Compasses, Elliptical and Triangular Compasses, and all sorts of Common Compasses . . . N. B. He sets Load Stones on Silver or Brass, after the best manner.*

A brass plain surveying compass made by Greenleaf is in the collection of the New Hampshire Historical Society. Another contender is Rowland Houghton (1678-1744), a maker of wooden pumps and wooden pipes in Boston who sold all types of water drawing equipment. An account of Houghton will be included in a future issue.
